The book of Leviticus can sometimes feel daunting, listing one rule after the other. Some of these laws are appealing and seem like a good idea, while others can be a bit more challenging to understand in a con-



temporary context or with our progressive values. Just a few weeks ago in parshat Kedoshim we read from the heart of this book, located squarely in the center of the Torah scroll. Parshat Kedoshim opens by reminding us that "You shall be holy, for I, Y-H-V-H your God, am holy," and this is the main reason given for following God's laws and walking this path of righteousness. In the middle of this parsha, we find what I have come to believe is the central teaching of all of Judaism. Leviticus 19:18 urges us to "love your fellow/neighbor/ friend as yourself," v'ahavtah l'reacha kamocha. As my year here at Or Hadash draws a close, it has become abundantly clear to me that mitzvah is also at the heart of this community.

President's Message

Balance

In one sense the year is winding down as we move closer to summer when synagogue activities lessen. On the other hand, Or Hadash is now truly brimming with activity. This is the season of many b'nai mitzvah and of lots of programs to keep us all engaged in our synagogue community. My first presidential year is drawing to a close. We are sadly getting closer to saying goodbye to our wonderful Sabbatical Rabbi Roni. Later in the summer, we will happily welcome Rabbi Josh back from sabbatical. Cold vs. warm, sad vs. happy, busy vs. leisurely — the theme here is balance. Being involved in governing and running a synagogue reinforces our need for balance in all of our lives. We need to balance the interests of different groups within the synagogue. We balance our calendar with activities and programs that aim to involve everyone.

The fiscal face of that balance comes from the contributions that we each make through our membership dues to support the day-to-day operation of Or Hadash. Our economic reality is such that to continue to achieve the fiscal balance that enables us to share our beautiful home and to enjoy the excellence of our rabbinic leadership, our religious school and our synagogue administration, we need a new approach.

Our Development Committee, under the leadership of Lani Moss, is introducing a plan that will focus on supporting Or Hadash by raising 10% of our operating budget from beyond the scope of membership dues. This new Annual Giving Campaign will formally begin during High Holy Days this coming September. Benjamin Franklin is credited with saying, "God helps those who help themselves." This proverb or truism is apropos to the Annual Giving Campaign. As a congregation we have always relied on combining the investments of time, of skill and of money that each and every one of us provides and that result in Or Hadash.

Now we are being asked to move Or Hadash into the list of worthy recipients of our tzedakah dollars. During our recent budget planning, a preliminary introduction to this program was launched to a targeted group of members and a sizeable sum was committed toward our goal. Come September, the entire congregation will be asked to join this effort and it is one of the committee's goals to achieve 100% participation. If you have not thought of Or Hadash as a tzedakah, think of the adage that states, "charity begins at home." Let's begin our tzedakah lists by setting aside a donation to

HIGH HOLY DAY NEWS AT OR HADASH

There will be some changes. We will have no more complaints about standing on a sloping floor. Our Family Service will be held at a separate time from the larger service. That is a good thing because it will enable Rabbi Josh to spend quality time at the Family Service instead of rushing back and forth. There will be limited parking in Or Hadash's lot and most of our parking will take place off site with shuttle transportation to Or Hadash. Not such a bad thing considering the detours that we are enduring from the extensive road construction around our building.

So please stay tuned for all of the details over the summer and please don't look for your directions to Gratz. Come home to Or Hadash!

Waldman played his first public performance at the age of 8. He was educated in Israel, Europe and the United States, after which he made his New York debut on the International Series at Carnegle Hall. Jeunesse Musicales.

Maestro Waldman is a versatile performer. He has earned acclaim both for his playing of the standard repertory and for his thoughtful and stylish interpretations of Baroque music. He has also championed rarely performed nineteenth century masterpieces and commissioned or premiered works by contemporary American and Israeli composers.

Born in the Ukraine to Holocaust survivors, Waldman has been presenting rarely performed gems composed by Eastern European Jews, many of whom perished during World War II in the Holocaust or were silenced by Soviet repression. As Artistic Director of Music Bridges International, Mr. Waldman was able to rediscover these pieces by searching music libraries and obscure music collections in Russia, Ukraine, Czech Republic and Israel. They represent a wide spectrum of stylistic influences on Jewish composers: impressionistic, neoclassical, folk and Klezmer. These pieces fill an unexplored gap in early twentieth century Jewish music repertory which fully deserves to be heard today.

From the Spiritual Life Committee

Spirituality

As noted in previous HaKesher articles, the mission statement of the Or Hadash Spiritual Life Committee is "to work to provide a means to meet congregants' spiritual needs within a framework of evolving Jewish Reconstructionist principles." Accordingly, I'd like to draw attention to several Or Hadash activities which are designed to meet congregants' spiritual needs on an ongoing basis. These are the Alternative Saturday Morning Service and two Torah Study Groups.

The Alternate Saturday Morning Services are held nearly every Saturday Morning at Or Hadash from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon. On mornings when there is a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, this service takes place in the Rabbi's study or outdoors (patio or Healing Garden, weather permitting). When there is no Bar/Bat Mitzvah, the Alternate Service is held in the sanctuary, the Rabbi's study, or outdoors.

That covers the logistics, but what makes this service spiritual? The spirituality comes from a combination of factors: spirited singing, inclusion of English readings to enhance the meaning of the prayers, and periodic pauses in the service for discussion about the prayers. In addition, on Saturdays when Rabbi Roni is not available to lead, the service becomes group-led. Attendees spontaneously call out page numbers for the next prayer or reading of their choice. This may sound disorganized, but it really works! More important, it creates a group spirit of closeness and shared responsibility that greatly enhances the service. This brief description can't possibly capture the flavor of this service, so please stop by on a Saturday morning and see for yourself. All are welcome!

The Evening Torah Study Group has a similar atmosphere. It takes place two evenings a month (usually, but not always, on Tuesdays) at Or Hadash, 7:30-9:00 P.M. It's a small group – usually three to five people - and is involved in intensive study of Torah. Intensive in the sense that only ten to twelve verses are studied in detail (i.e., word-by-word) in the course of an evening. Some knowledge of Hebrew is helpful, but not necessary. Instead, the focus is on insights participants can bring to the verses, as well as traditional Torah commentaries. There is occasional discussion on translation of the Hebrew, but only as it might affect the understanding of the verse. Participants have all found that delving into the Torah in such detail can't help but provide new insights into the core text of Judaism. After more than five years of

Changes Around the Reconstructionist Movement

In Or Hadash is affiliated with the Jewish Reconstructionist Movement. Our movement has been comprised of 3 branches: JRF- the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation, RRC- the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College and RRA- the Reconstructionist Rabbinical Association. In order to keep this progressive movement on the forefront of Jewish life in the 21st century, change is on the horizon.

At the JRF biennial last November, a resolution was passed to empower the RRC and JRF to work toward developing a new unified organization. On April 10th, a meeting was held in Philadelphia at which Or Hadash was represented. At that meeting, a vote was taken to dissolve JRF and to merge it with the RRC to create a new single organization of the Reconstructionist Movement. The Reconstructionist Rabbinical Association will remain a separate entity that will be represented on the board of the new organization. Camp JRF will be represented on the organization's board as well. I think we can assume that a new name for the camp will happen too.

So we just had a wonderful, if not exactly kosher, meal at Tex Mex Connection in North Wales. We've been going there for years, Brian LOVES the chips and salsa, and the margaritas aren't bad. But now this symbol is on the menu.

Tex Mex has gone green. It is a certified green restaurant. But what does that mean? First, let's think about a few things that a restaurant does that aren't green. I invite you to explore www.dinegreen.com; but this will give you some idea of the problems.



- 1. Packaging of foods and other products used often can't be recycled.
- 2. Leftovers and other organic waste are thrown in with the rest of the garbage.
- 3. Cleaners and disinfectants are often toxic and eventually run off into the ecosystem.
- 4. Water is often used excessively and loaded with grease and other contaminants.
- 5. Electricity is often wasted in everything from refrigerators and dining room or kitchen doors that are left open to excessive use of dishwashers.

These are obvious but there are some less obvious issues, such as:

1. The restaurant is out in the country. That idyllic setting requires extra driving by patrons, employees, delivery trucks and trash removal.



- 2. The building's energy system is inefficient? Converted Victorian houses and barns were specifically built to breath. That way they didn't asphyxiate themselves while trying to keep warm.
- 3. Are the foods and other products used locally grown and/or produced?
- 4. Ditto for the building. Where did the materials and the labor to build it come from?

All of these are important in determining the impact of a restaurant on our planet, Earth.

The Green Restaurant Association (GRA) certifies a certified Green Restaurant. GRA is now certifying restaurants based on version 4.0. They inspect:

- 1. Water efficiency
- 2. Waste reduction
- 3. Sustainable furnishings and building materials
- 4. Sustainable foods
- 5. Energy
- 6. Disposables
- 7. Chemical and pollution reduction

If you think this sounds like LEED for restaurants, then you're right. It is LEED for restaurants. But since most



Americans eat out at least two times a week, it is very important. I strongly recommend that you ask your favorite eatery if they are certified as a Green Restaurant. If not, you should ask them why not. Restaurants are businesses and the owners and operators will not bother with this unless their clients begin asking.

So go ahead. Ask a question. Put them on the spot. This is a perfect place to apply an old Chinese proverb; No single raindrop considers itself responsible for the flood. In the meantime, eat at Green Restaurants like Tex Mex Connection (sorry Rabbi). The food is great and they have a sincere interest in the plant Earth.

I also invite you to check out the garbage cans next time before you eat. Using trash in a sustainable manner helps. It may also help with your diet (sorry, I DIDN'T say that). www.landfillfree.com

Rabbi Steinsaltz: "The mitzvoth ("commandments") provide the content of what it means to be a Jew. Like the abundant, complex leaves and flowers of a tree, their manifold, seemingly disparate forms actually comprise a wondrous whole: the derech, or way, of Torah..."
