From Rabbi Josh

Burning to Transform

Early in the book of Exodus, God famously calls to Moses from a burning bush and commands him to go to Pharaoh to tell him to free the Israeli slaves. This momentous encounter is a pivotal one in human history: a promise that God cares about the wellbeing of people who are suffering and oppressed and will help us find the courage and resources necessary to bring justice and peace to a broken world. It is a promise that God stands with us when we undertake difficult and even dangerous work for the sake of the greater good.



The work we are called to carry out at this season is not, at first glance, dangerous but is certainly difficult! In the lead up to the High Holidays we are supposed to perform *tshuvah*, to carefully and deliberately scrutinize our behavior over the past year and seek to repent in those cases where we have inevitably fallen short of our goals and ideals. After sincerely apologizing to those whom we have harmed by our actions we ask God for forgiveness so we can enter the New Year with a fresh slate, drawing on the promise to stand with us as we strive to carry out what God demands from us. In this way we are like the bush which burns with fire but is not consumed: we allow the impulse for change and transformation – a potentially dangerous force – to burn within us, yet instead of destroying us it instead purifies and strengthens us, burning away only those shortcomings and misdeeds and allowing our core to emerge intact and ready for whatever the New Year demands from us.

This year, we are going to be focusing as a congregation on the story of Moses and the burning bush. Or Hadash is taking part in a new initiative through the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College called the Transformative Text Project. At a number of points throughout the year, RRC student Malka Packer will be with us to teach about the burning bush and inviting us to encounter the text and its messages through study, creativity, and experiential education across the spectrum of our congregation, from the youngest students in our school to the most veteran adult learners. The goal of the program is for us to be transformed individually and as a community through our ongoing engagement with this central Jewish text and I am excited about the plans Malka, Barbara Weisman, and I have put in place to allow us to experience the story of the burning bush on a number of levels. I am delighted that Or Hadash was chosen as one of the synagogues to participate in the initial cohort of the Transformative Text Project and look forward to the fruits of this collaboration.

Please mark your calendars for Sunday, October 14 when Malka will be on hand to introduce and kick off our year-long project. We will have a program for school students and parents beginning at 9:00 and then for other members beginning at 11:30. I invite you to join us for a year of learning and transformation as we begin 5773.

- We will kick off our program year with a Back-to-Shul Barbeque on September 7th. Watch the weekly e-announcements for details. This year, the BBQ is free for all current and prospective members "WITH ADVANCED RESERVATION"!!

An essential part of belonging to a community is participating in that community. Or Hadash owes much of its success to our superb professional and rabbinic staff, but we would not exist without our dedicated volunteers. Participation and volunteer efforts can take many forms in our community. This year, we are swapping our "traditional" mitzvah cards at the High Holidays for a new volunteer sign-up mechanism we are calling "Gift of the Hand."
